PUPILS COMPLETE THEIR SATS WITH CONFIDENCE AND DETERMINATION


A huge congratulations to our brilliant pupils in Year 2 and Year 6, who have now completed their SATs.



A DREAM DAY OUT AT THE STADIUM FOR SMIT






We were delighted to receive heartwarming photos from Mr Modi, father of Year 4 pupil Smit, showing his son enjoying a day to remember at a recent football match.

On Tuesday, Year 6 pupils from East Lane Primary School took a fascinating trip back in time with a visit to Bletchley Park, the historic site that played a vital role in World War II.

During the visit, pupils learned about the life and work of Alan Turing and the brilliant minds behind the wartime codebreaking effort. They explored the story of the Enigma machine and the extraordinary achievements of the people who helped change the course of history through their work at Bletchley.

The day included a guided tour that took them around the key locations across the site, offering insight into how messages were intercepted, decoded and passed on during the war.

ART ACROSS THE YEAR GROUPS



Creativity has been thriving at East Lane Primary School this term, with pupils across all year groups engaging in exciting and thoughtful art projects. In Year 2, pupils have been diving into the world of abstract art, taking inspiration from Russian artist Kazimir Malevich. Through their own handmade collages, they explored how colour, line and shape can be used to express ideas and emotions without relying on recognisable images. Their bold and imaginative work reflects a deep understanding of one of the earliest forms of Western abstract art.


Over in Year 4, pupils have been learning about the work of French symbolist painter Charles Guilloux. They have developed their brush control and colour mixing skills to create dreamy, swirling landscapes in watercolour. Their work reflects a growing understanding of stylisation and atmosphere in painting, with each piece capturing a sense of movement and mood.

Meanwhile, Year 6 artists have been using their creativity to explore powerful social messages through visual art. Inspired by contemporary artist Bob and Roberta Smith, pupils created striking artworks that use text as both a design feature and a way to share meaningful statements. Their bold, colourful pieces show just how effectively words and art can come together to communicate big ideas.

Art at East Lane Primary continues to inspire pupils to think critically, experiment bravely, and express themselves confidently. These projects show that creativity is alive and well in every classroom, and that East Lane's young artists have voices worth seeing and hearing.

SAFEGUARDING UPDATE: WHAT UK PARENTS SHOULD KNOW THIS MAY



Online Grooming What Parents Need to Know

Online grooming is sadly on the rise, and it's more important than ever for parents to stay aware and involved in their child's digital life.

🚨 Key Facts

- Offences rising: Over 7,000 cases of adults contacting children with harmful intent were recorded in the last year – almost double compared to six years ago.
- Apps to watch: Nearly half of these incidents happened on Snapchat, where messages can disappear quickly and location sharing is easy.
- Who is being targeted? Most victims are girls aged 12–15, but younger children are increasingly at risk too.
- Self-generated content: Many children are being tricked or pressured into sharing inappropriate images or videos of themselves online.

🕍 What You Can Do This Half-Term

- Talk openly: Chat with your child about what they're doing online and remind them never to share personal details.
- Set limits: Keep screen time balanced and agree on which sites and apps are okay to use.
- Stay aware: Learn about the apps your child is using and how they work.
- Act fast: If something doesn't feel right, report it to the platform or the NSPCC.
